The American Association of Teachers of French (AATF) has organized Le Grand Concours for over 60 years. The contest is open to all students of French, from FLES through senior high school. It is a 60-minute national exam comprised of reading and aural comprehension, as well as grammar and cultural topics.

IMPORTANT

*Again this year tests may be administered in individual schools. **Absolute test security must be ensured. Teachers must not view** testing materials before March 30th, after the end of testing, and it is important to note that **a teacher may not proctor his or her own students** during the test. Find another teacher or guidance counselor who will accept the responsibility of proctoring the test (and of keeping the test booklets and CD's until April 2nd). (Exception is the FLES contest in which teachers must proctor their own students, but materials are to be kept secure until the testing day.) **I will send the material to the person who is indicated on the order form as the exam proctor.** That person will need a CD player and number 2 pencils and will need to verify that the CD is not defective. **TEST SECURITY IS VERY IMPORTANT.** The exam may take place at your regular class time (60 minutes minimum), or at any other time you arrange (after school, etc.) FLES teachers may choose their own date between Feb.15th and 28th, 2012, and indicate it on their entry sheet. **Middle/Secondary School teachers must mark the date they choose for contest administration on the Order Form.**

*Enroll ALL your French classes, not just one or two! All students are eligible. (There are no negative consequences to this test!)

*Avoid using your own classroom for the contest. Instead, arrange to administer the exam in a conference room, computer lab, library, media room, or the proctor's classroom. If you do use your classroom, you must remove relevant materials and/or cover the walls.

*You might consider offering extra credit to students who test or asking for parent/community volunteers to sponsor students who cannot afford the test.

Remember

You the teacher will keep the tests and CDs after the Contest is over. This is a **national standardized test**, used by some colleges as a placement test. At that price, it is a bargain. It is also good practice for your students. **Since you keep the tests, consider asking your school to pay for the testing!**



Enrollment & Placement Guidelines

What follows is an abbreviated version of the placement guidelines for the *Grand Concours*. The **complete guidelines** can be found online at <http://frenchteachers.org/concours>

Except for students in division D, the student shall take the *Concours* at the level which corresponds to the high school credit level assigned to the French course he or she is currently taking. Thus, for example, students at any school level who will receive high school credit for French 2 at the end of the academic year will be placed in *Concours* level 2.

Division A (Levels 01-5) is for the American-born student who has not lived with French-speaking parents, who has not attended a French school and who has not lived in a French-speaking community. Most students will participate in Division A.

Division B (Levels 01-2) is for students with limited advantages at their level—as suggested above or FLES or instruction in French above the 6th grade level.

Contact me for help placing students with unusual backgrounds. Division B is not a possibility at levels 3-5.

Division C (Levels 01-5) is for students who have a more extensive French background and includes all foreign exchange students, even those who are not native French speakers.

Contact me for help placing students with unusual backgrounds.

Division D (Levels 01-5) is for students who are in schools with a block schedule in which one semester = one year and who, at the date of the *Concours*, are one level higher in French than they were at the beginning of the fall semester. They may participate in the contest at the level they have completed and they compete against Division A students at that level.

Division E (Levels 01-5) is for students who are in schools with a block schedule in which one semester = one year and who, at the date of the *Concours*, are not taking French. These students take the contest at the level which corresponds to the highest level French course they have completed. They compete only against students with the same background.
