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
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NDE World Languages Initiatives for 2021-2022

In the coming academic year (2021-2022), there will be three NDE World Languages initiatives: implementation of 2019 NDE World Languages Standards, advocacy for the Nebraska Seal of Biliteracy, and improvement of technology literacy.

Implementation of 2019 Nebraska World Language Standards

The NDE World Language Standards were approved in 2019, however, the implementation process was delayed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In the coming academic year, the NDE World Languages program will provide professional learning on the introduction and implementation of the revised standards. Follow-up support will be available upon request. NDE World Languages also welcomes participation and involvement from Nebraska educators in creating standards-based teaching resources, which will be shared across the state as part of NDE's Open Education Resources (OER) hub. Advocacy of Nebraska Seal of Biliteracy (NBOS)

The Nebraska Seal of Biliteracy is a collaboration between the Nebraska Department of Education and the Nebraska International Languages Association to acknowledge high school students who can demonstrate proficiency in English and one other language. It is recognized by employers and postsecondary institutions even in other states. One of the goals of this initiative is to make more Nebraska students aware of the program, thereby increasing the number of qualified students who successfully complete the application process. In the 2021-2022 academic year, NDE World Languages is committed to advocating the NSOB across the state by working together with ESUs, school districts, teachers, counselors, and community members to maximize the impact so that more and more Nebraskan high school graduates can benefit. Any help and support will be greatly appreciated.

Technology Literacy Improvement

Technology integration in world language education has become an undeniable trend, especially during and after the pandemic. To be better prepared for future unexpected situations (like the pandemic), world language teachers need to improve technology literacy and develop skills to effectively integrate educational technology to promote learner motivation, to provide equitable instruction, and to involve language learners in meaningful communication in authentic contexts. Engaging learners with online manipulatives by [Flippity](#)

Flippity is a website that offers a variety of templates to generate games and activities to engage learners either in-person or online. One of the most popular templates is [Manipulatives](#), which generates an online version of the traditional envelope activities. 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Story from [Micah Ringlein](#) – Our Talented Picture Book Author

Micah has just received his paperweight as acknowledgement for his ten years of excellent French teaching at Omaha Central.

Here is his story...

"As my wife and I are both seasoned, public school French teachers, we had been discussing approaches to encouraging multilingualism in our home as well as with our friends and family for our 2020-born daughter's benefit. We had been making conscious efforts to provide her with texts and toys that offered Spanish and French, as well as surround her with engaging contexts in those same languages whenever possible. It is important to us that our daughter grows up understanding that languages are keys to connecting with people and to becoming an aware and understanding world citizen.

"Around the same time of our discussions, I started experimenting with digital illustration to make a series of one-panel comics, *Peas in a Pod*. My goal was to share the excitement, crazy blunders, and difficulties of being a first-time parent through a family of green peas. Shortly after making my first handful of comics, I was inspired by my wife, Masey, to write, illustrate, and have Amazon publish my children's book, [The Little Green Pea](#). Although it was created as a private tribute to her being an outstanding mother, Macey encouraged me to make it publicly available due to its universal messages of love and dedication.

"Putting these two contexts together, it seemed only natural that I then make *The Little Green Pea* available in as many languages as possible. I was able to consult my very patient, polyglot friends and co-workers to make now-published text translations into Spanish (*La lentejita verde*) and French (*Maman petit pois*) with Japanese, Chinese, German, and Russian on the way. In addition, I asked notably influential women in my life to contribute their voices for a YouTube read aloud in each language.

"Not only has all of this served as a way to connect with my friends and co-workers, but it has also inspired me to pick up where I left off with learning other languages. Moving forward, it is my absolute pleasure to continue documenting our growing family through the comics and future books with the pea family. It is perhaps an odd parental joy to find out that someone else has a child that also loves to find and try to eat fuzz balls off



the floor. Furthermore, all of the technical skills that I have acquired will lend themselves handily to improving the quality of materials that I can offer my students. Learning digital illustration, animation, video, and audio recording has been quite the leap for me, but if you're considering doing this yourself for the benefit of your classroom, just know that it's nothing compared to learning how to do remote learning in 2020.
