

NSoBL Updates: Recipients, Support, & Additional Review Round

2022 Spring Recipients Finalized

The spring review round of the Nebraska Seal of Biliteracy has ended. The recipient list was finalized on May 15th. NDE World Language sincerely thanks Dr. Janet Eckerson from the University of Nebraska-Kearney for all the support and effort in the review process. Thanks to the joint effort of district coordinators and world language teachers all over Nebraska, 144 students are receiving 145 NSoBL in the 2022 spring round. The number of recipients in the 2022 spring round is more than the total number of recipients last year (112).



Congratulations to 2022 spring recipients of the NSoBL! As shown in the pie chart, two seals are awarded for Chinese; three are awarded for French, three are for Latin; one for Somali Maxaa;

137 for Spanish. It is the first time NSoBL has been awarded for the language of Somali Maxaa. The recipient list will be announced in News Release per parent permission in late May. Congratulations to 2022 spring recipients of the NSoBL!

Additional Review Round added in November

Based on discussion at the Spring NSoBL Review meeting with NDE World Language and NILA representatives, an additional round will be added starting this year. The new application deadlines will be August 1st, November 1st, and April 1st. The application will continue to be open throughout the year, and the review will start




on the designated dates mentioned above. NDE World Language encourages ESU leaders, district world language coordinators, and world language teachers to plan accordingly and spread the word to your community and students.

Dual Language Program at Omaha Public Schools

The Omaha Public Schools Dual Language Instructional Model serves as a model for the country. It is one of fewer than fifteen programs in the United States that spans grades K-12. The instructional model began at Marrs Elementary in the year 2000. It now serves more than 3500 students in ten schools. OPS is committed to providing a K-12 pathway for students in the instructional model. It is not an additional program but rather a difference in approach to instruction. All the dual language classrooms in OPS serve English speakers, Spanish speakers, and bilingual students. Eight of the OPS schools have been recognized as "International Spanish Academies" by the Ministry of Education of Spain.

Research shows an immersion advantage in English Learners meeting proficiency beyond early grades (Steele, JL., et al, 2015). Dual Language also has a positive impact on non-English learners, students who are bilingual yet fluent in English, native English speakers, and students with special learning considerations (Thomas & Collier, 2012). Special Education students also benefit from bilingual education with no detriment on language expected development or abilities (Paradis J., Genesee F., Crago. M., 2015). Additional benefits of learning in two languages include more favorable attitudes toward being bilingual and toward students who are different from themselves, stronger cultural identity and high self-esteem, better overall attendance, fewer behavior referrals, lower cost of education, development of unactivated brain areas and increased creativity and problem-solving skills.

2023 CSCTFL Call for Proposals

Lead with Language Teacher Scholarship Program - ACTFL



ACTFL's Lead with Language Teacher Scholarship Program provides merit-based scholarships to graduating high school seniors committed to pursuing the language teaching profession in languages other than

English. Awardees will receive an award of \$1,500 per academic year. Scholarships may be renewed three times following the initial award for a cumulative for \$6,000 per recipient. Administrators and world language teachers, please encourage your students to prepare all the required materials and apply by 4:00 pm May 27th Central Time. On the application page, you will find the list of required materials. Applicants will be notified of the results no later than July 15th.

2022 World Language Fair at Open Language Resource Center

This all-day event will bring high-school students to the Lawrence campus for a day focused on exploring world languages and cultures. Presentations at previous Fairs have showcased almost two dozen languages and have included Bollywood and Flamenco dance lessons, Chinese calligraphy, Japanese anime, Roman graffiti, and Portuguese karaoke.



Past presenters have included faculty from Benedictine College, Fort Hays State University,

Johnson County Community College, Kansas State University, Missouri State University, Pittsburg State University, the University of Kansas, and Wichita State University. An informational fair will also be held over an extended lunch hour for students to learn about scholarships, study abroad, and language programs at all participating colleges and universities. More details about the event, including complete programs from previous Fairs, are available on the OLRC website (olrc.ku.edu/wlf).

The event is free for all registered attendees and includes a boxed lunch and a range of prizes. Schools are responsible for their own transportation costs to the event, but those unable to afford those costs are asked to contact the Open Language Resource Center (olrc@ku.edu) about possible support.

Technology Tool of the Month: Pixton Comic & Storyboard Builder



One of the most important things that world language teachers have learned from the experience of teaching during the pandemic might be to allow student choices and voices and build the learning community. Pixton is

a tool that helps teachers to allow choices and voices to build a learning community, while engage students in language learning projects. Pixton is an online comic & storyboard building platform. Teachers can create classes for students. Students can: a. enroll in the classes their teachers have created for them; b. create avatars for themselves; c. use their own avatars and other available characters to create comics and stories to showcase their learning results; d. present and download their own comics and stories to the class, peers, or parents. Also, teachers can create class pictures for the whole class even when some students might have chosen remote learning. The image on the right showed Pixton class photos of some of my classes. The use of avatars instead of actual pictures avoids unnecessary exposure to social media while still strengthening the sense of belongingness for students.

Teacher Stories – Ching Yuk Lam




Ni hao! My name is Ching Yuk Lam. I am an educator at Omaha Public Schools (OPS) with a multicultural background. I was born in mainland China and immigrated to Hong Kong during elementary school. As a result, I speak Chinese, Cantonese, Taiwanese, and English. I serve as a World Language Teacher at Beveridge Magnet Middle School and Burke High School. This is my 7th year teaching Chinese at OPS. I love spending time with my husband and three lovely kids. I enjoy cooking, baking, and crafting.

My passion for teaching was planted in middle school. I am grateful for the great teachers I had from 7-12th grades, who exemplified professional knowledge and genuine caring for students' academic and personal growth. To me and my peers, our favorite teachers are not only teachers, but also like moms and friends. So, we

called them "Teacher Mama" (mother), which perfectly reflects the Chinese idiom, "A teacher for a day is a father for a lifetime". This significant teacher-student relationship made meaningful learning so natural for me and inspired me to become a teacher. I believe that teachers individually and collectively may not change the world but can improve it and make it a much better one. In this sense, working as a teacher does not mean it is a job, but a mission to younger generations.

This sense of mission got stronger when I became a parent. Through parenting, I have much more understanding, respect, and patience towards my students and their parents. Parenting truly makes me see the teaching and learning processes in a different lens in the classroom. I am more passionate in engaging, caring and encouraging students in our daily conversations. I believe there is a significant meaning of my place in my adolescent students.

Learning Chinese is challenging, yet my students found it's not as difficult as they thought; indeed it's an enjoyable journey. In addition to various implements of face to face and online learning activities and games, the students are always involved in different hands-on projects, such as Beijing Mask Making after learning Colors; Chinese-knot Bracelet, Dumpling Making and Cooking, and Lantern Making with a Red Envelope for Chinese New Year celebrations. It melted my heart when one of the students wrote, "my dumpling experience was good. I was feeling down but the joy of everyone I saw brighten up my day. The dumplings were really good and it's cool how food can bring people together the way it did today."



"Tell me and I'll forget; show me and I may remember; involve me and I'll understand." This proverb reflects my students' experience as Chinese Language learners. Lifelong learning happens when students are engaged and involved in real life hands-on activities.


