Co-Teaching


There are a variety of service models available for school districts to deliver English language development to students who speak a language other than English as their primary or home language. One model is co-teaching. This is a partnership between the content area teacher and a specialist EL teacher to


deliver the core instruction with appropriate language supports and scaffolds.

What are the benefits? Teachers get to collaborate and learn from each other. All students get to participate in the core classroom and interact with the different teachers and teaching styles. Co-teaching enhances the participation of EL students and is intended to improve their academic and linguistic performance.


How can we make the most of co-teaching? Teachers need time to plan together and build their working relationship. Both teachers need to be seen as equal partners and respect each other.

Teachers need clearly defined roles and responsibilities, yet they also need to be flexible as they work together. Co-teaching needs the support of the administration through leadership, professional









development, and honoring the time teachers need to be able to plan together. According to <u>A District's Guide to Co-Teaching</u>, there are different types of co-teaching models. See some of the different resources to read more about co-teaching.
