ESU 5: Addressing the Teacher Shortage through Distance Learning

Across the State, and the Nation, we are experiencing an acute **Teacher Shortage**. World Language Education is among the Content Areas hardest hit.



According to the 2022 NDE Technology Profile data, **27% of School Districts in the State do not have a World Language Teacher on Staff and must rely on Distance Learning** to provide World Language offerings. Compounding the problem, the pool of World Language

Teachers continues to shrink. Data from NDE's Education Directory shows **the number of World Language Teachers in our State shrank 24% from the 2021-22 Academic Year to 2022-23**. Rural School Districts are most heavily impacted.

ESU 5 houses an Educational Hub of seven World Language Educators who currently serve over 400 students across 16 Public School Districts in our State through Distance Learning. We connect with our partners schools live everyday. Teacher Stories – Hanihani Traore Moundiba

I am a French teacher at Lincoln Northeast and Lefler middle school. I am a multilingual and multicultural person. I speak three local languages from my West African home country which are Bwamu, Dioula and Mooré. I am a perfect bilingual (French-English) person. I know some German from taking it as a foreign language in high school and college. I am usually very calm, observant, not showing a smiling face. Yet I am kind, full of joy and lovely inside. My research focus is on translanguaging. I love observing my students use their linguistic repertoires during class.



I love French as a language, because it is complex and beautiful if you grasp its essence. It is known as a poetic language, but there is more to it than just that. The French language has a soul and if you fall in love with it, you will feel delighted learning it or teaching it as a world language. It's a "je t'aime, moi non plus" feeling kind of thing. It will be a wrong perception to just think you are trying to acquire or teach a target language. I would say learning French is embracing a journey where you learn a second culture, a future job eventually, and encounter a soul mate for life! For, once you connect with the language, you win a life skill!!!

Growing up I learned French as a language of instruction. Hence, all my academic experience from elementary to college was in French. I got inspired by French culture, literature, and philosophy. And I can tell you how inspired I become when I am in class, because I want to share this beautiful language with my students. I want them to embrace it, love it and own it despite the challenges they might face. I tell them that if I learned it and possess it now, they can do the same. Sometimes, I think I am too passionate about it. What really makes me the teacher I am beside all my sources of inspiration, I would confess it is the student population I have in my classes. Seeing myself as a resource for them is my greatest motivation; Knowing that I can answer their questions, meet their needs where they are makes my days even when challenges occur in class. As far as collaboration is concerned, I must confess that I would not be successful without my colleagues from the World Language department, my supervisors from both the building and the District. I am so grateful for this win-win collaboration.

A good world language teaching is basically meeting the learners where they are, a bit like the ZPD of Vygotsky, then provide the required support they need, and see them rising to the next level. When I see a student who possesses a chunk of knowledge of the target language, that's the best satisfaction for me as a teacher. I then feel that my learners are getting it and owning it.

There is a lot to do to improve my teaching practices. Like I mentioned earlier, I am sometimes a bit passionate about teaching French and I tend to believe that all my learners love it the way I do. I need a little adjustment at this level to make my learners feel comfortable joining me in the exploration of the language. I also need to inject some fun activities, because if you ask my students, they will probably tell you that I am too focused on providing them with the standard ways of learning, with less fun. I love the concept of learning by playing, yet I have a hard time making a nice combination of both. Another thing that I might work on is also showing more of happiness and excitement to my learners, because I take teaching too academically when I am in class and tend to forget that I have teenagers who love to have fun even when they are in class.

I strongly hope that if my learners do not become passionate about French as I am, at least, I hope they complete the two or three years program as skilled French language speakers, who will always remember this linguistic asset and use it to their advantage wherever they are.

Technology of the Month: <u>ChatGPT</u>: Friend or Foe?

ChatGPT has been a vigorously discussed topic ever since it was released by OpenAI. What is ChatGPT? Here is how ChatGPT introduced itself responding to the prompt "Provide a general description of ChatGPT in an informative tone in 150 words."

ChatGPT is an advanced language model developed by OpenAI, based on the GPT-3.5 architecture. It is one of the largest and most powerful language models in the world, with 175 billion parameters. ChatGPT is designed to generate human-like responses to text prompts, and it can understand and generate text in multiple languages. The model has been trained on a massive amount of data from the internet, including books, articles, and websites, which allows it to understand a wide range of topics and respond with a high degree of accuracy.

ChatGPT has many potential applications, including language translation, chatbot development, and content generation. Its advanced capabilities have the potential to revolutionize the way we communicate and interact with technology. As an AI language model, ChatGPT is constantly learning and improving, which means its

accuracy and effectiveness will continue to increase over time. Overall, ChatGPT is a cutting-edge technology that has the potential to transform many industries and aspects of our daily lives.

Many concerns arise due to the potential challenges that ChatGPT might bring to World Language Education. ChatGPT is capable of generating text on required proficiency level. For example, ChatGPT generated a paragraph based on the

prompt "Describe Yu Xiao's typical school day at high school in novice high Chinese in first person" within a minute. ChatGPT is also capable of generating more

pieces of text responding to the same prompt. Many teachers would ask the following question: how to address the problem if students use ChatGPT to generate their homework? An open discussion about ChatGPT with is recommended so that teachers and students are on the same page about do's and don't about ChatGPT. Texts generated by ChatGPT is very likely error-free, which is quite different from student work. Next, ChatGPT identifies itself as an AI tool, and it does not have feelings or emotions (see the screenshot). Therefore, it would be helpful to add requirements to include personal feelings and emotions in writing assignments, which will make it difficult for ChatGPT to "do the homework" for your students. Then, it is also recommended that teachers start the students with pencil and pen for any writing assignments for the first draft before going digital. Another recommendation is to have students to create mindmap before they write and use the mindmap to guide their writing. Also, asking students to present or read their writing and share the process of writing would help.

The rapid advancement of AI tools is inevitable, and world language teachers need to embrace the change so that challenges can be transformed to opportunities to enhance teaching and learning in world language classrooms. Here are a few ideas to take advantage of ChatGPT for your reference:

- 1. Use ChatGPT to generate additional reading materials based on student needs. Many teachers have to create materials on their own even when they have textbooks in order to provide adequate practice for students.
- Use ChatGPT to provide cultural information to save time searching on the internet. For example, ChatGPT generated detailed descritpion of "Zhua Zhou (celebration of first birthay in Chinese culture) responding to the prompt "Describe first birthday celebration in Chinese culture"
- Use ChatGPT to generate sample writings for student in class and lead a discussion about the writing so that students have an idea of what is expected. In this way, you are sending out the message that you are familiar with ChatGPT, which will more or lessdiscourage students from using it for their homework.
- 4. Provide different samples generated by ChatGPT and ask students to compare and contrast, discussing different expressions used and how those expressions will influence the understanding of the audience.
- 5. ChatGPT can also be used to provide ideas and activities to engage students to learn certain topics. For example, if you type in "provide activities to

engage students to learn about directions", and ChatGPT will generate a whole list of ideas for your reference.

6. Encourage students to interact with ChatGPT using the same topic and share what they learned from ChatGPT.
