Setting Students Up for Success!

Now that school has begun and students are getting settled into their routines, what can we do to set them up for a successful school year and a successful performance on the ELPA21 Summative Assessment?

One suggestion is to meet with each student and review ELPA21 performance from previous years as well as other data to help them set goals for this school year. (Sample Goal Sheet) Student goals can then be shared with their parents and teachers so that everyone is aware of what the student wants to achieve and can support them with their goal(s). It is important to keep the goal(s) and action steps as a focus so that students know what they are working towards and how they are making progress towards their goals throughout the year.

There are a few helpful resources from ELPA21 that can assist teachers as they support their students with their reading, writing, speaking, and listening goals. The ELPA21 Enrichment Activities provide practice tasks that are similar to what students will be expected to do on the

ELPA21 Summative. The <u>constructed response rubrics</u> give teachers good tools to help measure student performance. The EL Toolkit 2021 and the EL Enhanced Toolkit 2022 provide two tasks for each domain for each grade band with rubrics. These can be purchased at the <u>NABE Online Store</u>. Teachers can refer to the <u>ELP Standards and Proficiency Level Descriptors</u> for guidance in lesson planning and formative assessment.

Guidance: <u>US Department of Education:</u> Schools' Civil Rights Obligations to English learners and their parents - "The obligation not to discriminate based on race, color, or national origin requires public schools to take affirmative steps to ensure that limited English proficient (LEP) students, now more commonly known as English Learner (EL) students or English Language Learners (ELLs), can meaningfully participate in educational programs and services, and to communicate information to LEP parents in a language they can understand."
