#### **Seal Application Tips**

Due to the low approval rate of November round (108a approvals out of 478 applications), the NDE World Language Education would like to provide the following tips for reference.

- If students are using transcripts as proficiency evidence
  - it is recommended that students apply after they get their junior year grades so that they have six semesters of ELA course (or the equivaleny).
  - Regular World Language courses are NOT accepted. The accepted courses include six semesters of (or a combination of) Language

Course for Language Speakers (e.g., Spanish for Spanish Speakers, Arabic for Arabic Speakers), Honors Courses, AP Courses, and IB Courses. The grade required is C and above.

- Unofficial transcripts showing grades for multiple semesters are accepted, but progress reports are NOT accepted.
- Transcripts need to be uploaded as proficiency evidence for both English and the other language even if the same document is used as evidence for both languages.
- If students are using test results,
  - The documents need to display student' name, test type, and test results.
  - If multiple documents are needed to demonstrate proficiency, please combine the documents into one before uploading.

## Sustain/ Expand Your World Language Programs with J1 Teachers

The Education Office of the Embassy of Spain in the US has set, among its duties, "to support the English-Spanish bilingual programs in the K-12 education system in the United States," "to offer pedagogical, technical support to teachers of Spanish through the Spanish Resource Centers located at Universities in the U.S," as well as "to promote the Spanish language and culture in the U.S./Canadian education systems." The Visitor Teachers Program serves as a key tool to fulfill these duties while providing support to schools in Nebraska. The Education Office of the Embassy of Spain in the U.S.has had an Education Advisor in Nebraska for the last twenty-two years, managing the Visitor Teachers Program throughout most of this period.

#### What is the Visitor Teachers from Spain program?

It is a cultural exchange program by which highly qualified teachers from Spain come to the US to teach Spanish language and/ or content subjects through Spanish. Visitor teachers will also provide opportunities for the school communities to connect with schools in Spain, as well as to give a firsthand experience on the culture of Spain.

Candidates will be required to have a teaching license and endorsement to teach in Spain, to have a minimum of two years teaching experience and to be competent to communicate in English.

#### How does the selection process work?

The Education Office of the Embassy of Spain in the US will run an initial selection process, guaranteeing that all candidates meet the requirements. Then, according to the needs stated by the schools, the Education Advisor will provide



a complete profile (CV, transcripts and/ or certificates, as requested by the school) and if considered appropriate, the school or school district will run the necessary screening process and interviews. There is no obligation to hire, as with any other candidate. They will commit ourselves to look for the best candidates, who meet the school needs.

#### What does it entail for a school to host a visitor teacher?

The visitor teacher will be another member of the teaching staff at the school. So visitor teachers will be hired under the same conditions as any other staff member. During the first year of teaching, as is normally the case with newly arrived teachers, there needs to be a mentoring process, assist with the possible cultural shock. Host schools will also pay the sponsoring fees to <u>Cordell Hull Foundation</u>.

#### What is the Education Office's role?

The Education Office guarantees the availability of candidates while there is a need of Visitor Teachers through a yearly call for candidates in Spain. After an initial shortlisting, through a conscientious supervision of requirements, schools will be offered candidates that match their stated needs. With those teachers who are actually hired, the Education Office will also run training activities to make sure that the cultural shock is mitigated as much as possible, and that they have an initial pedagogical introduction to the differences in their contexts here in the US. It will also provide inservice training while the teachers are here, with schools having the opportunity to suggest possible fields for professional development. Furthermore, the Education Office will also monitor teachers to make sure that they can support teachers and schools during the whole process.

#### What is the teacher status in the US?

Candidates, after they are offered a contract or a letter of intent to hire, will undergo a process to be granted a J1 Visa, which will give them the required status to work in the US for a limited number of years (maximum of five years). In the case of Nebraska, it is the <u>Cordell Hull Foundation</u> who sponsors these Visas. Upon their return to Spain, these teachers will apply what they have learned in the US in the Spanish Educational System.

The Education Office of the Embassy of Spain in the US is a governmental body and will not charge any fees. The schools will only need to <u>pay the fees</u> for the sponsoring of the teachers' visas.

### Teacher Stories – Rebecca Spangler

My journey as a language student started in high school Spanish. While studying at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, I had a Spanish minor as I explored a few different majors. When I finally landed on Spanish education, I had the opportunity to work with Dr. Moeller and many of her fabulous graduate students. I met so many future colleagues and lifelong friends through this program. In the summers, I worked for Dr. Moeller as an administrative assistant and also a classroom management instructor for the StarTalk and Confucius Institute programs.



As an undergraduate, I studied abroad in Valparaíso, Chile. My student teaching experience was with the fabulous Katie Hayes at Pius. I will forever be thankful for her guidance and mentorship as I began my career as an educator. I spent the first



seven years of my career back home in Des Moines, lowa working at larger high schools with diverse world language departments. I also taught adult English Language Learners in the evenings at the local community college. In 2014, I started my Master's Degree through Southern Oregon University's program for Spanish language teachers. For three summers, I lived and studied in Guanajuato, México. This program helped me grow as an educator, improve my own language proficiency and form a network of Spanish

teachers across the United States. I am very thankful that we still do a lot of online collaboration together!

In 2019, my husband and I got married and I moved to Nebraska. I was hired at Conestoga Jr/Sr High School, which is also our home district. As a teacher, I work hard to make language class comprehensible and fun for each and every student



in the classroom. Conestoga is currently able to offer two dual enrollment Spanish courses through Southeast Community College. Another passion of mine is student travel. Last summer, I took a group of 28 from Conestoga to Panama and Costa Rica. This was my sixth trip with students and was an awesome experience for everyone involved. While there are many things I love about being at a small school, it has been challenging to be a department of one. I miss collaborating with other world language teachers in person, and currently collaborate a few times a year with Jessica Holz at Louisville. ## Technology Discussion of the Month: A few Tools to Spice up Student Engagement

Allowing different ways to demonstrate learning would always motivate and engage students. We are going to discuss three tools that can be used to add to your tool box to engage students.

<u>Ifaketextmessages</u> is a web tools to generate text message images for student-created conversations. It allows three students to participate in the conversation. Students can work together to create conversations using speach bubbles in different colors. The tool also allows students to edit displays for battery, connection, and settings.

This tool can also be used to create semi-authentic conversations as reading resources for students. The screenshot on the left shows a conversation in Spanish created using this tool.




This <u>Al Infographic</u> Maker helps to

create infographic. Once a topic put is put in the search bar, the platform will generate a draft infographic with different templates to choose from. In addition, users are able to edit and personalize to make the draft their own. The graphic below shows how a draft infographic is

generated.

Social media could be or potentially be a great platform for authentic communication for language learning, however, social media also brings many complications and problems for schooling. <u>Fakebook</u> allows teachers to create a closed "social media" platform to engage students in authentic communication that social media can provide without the potential problems from real social media.

Students can create their own account and friend each other and the teacher. It is important that the links to their account be recorded and saved appropriately so that students, their peers, and teachers can log on and interact with each other.



Teachers can set up routine networking requirements, requiring students to post

based on prompts and responded to posts from their peers. It can also used to keep journals to record what students can do and are willing to share in their learning journey. It is also encouraged to use Fakebook to share what students find out about the culture they are learning to generate interest and conversation on cultural exploration.
