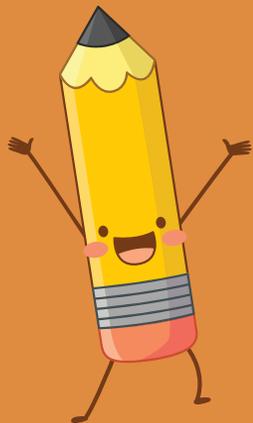

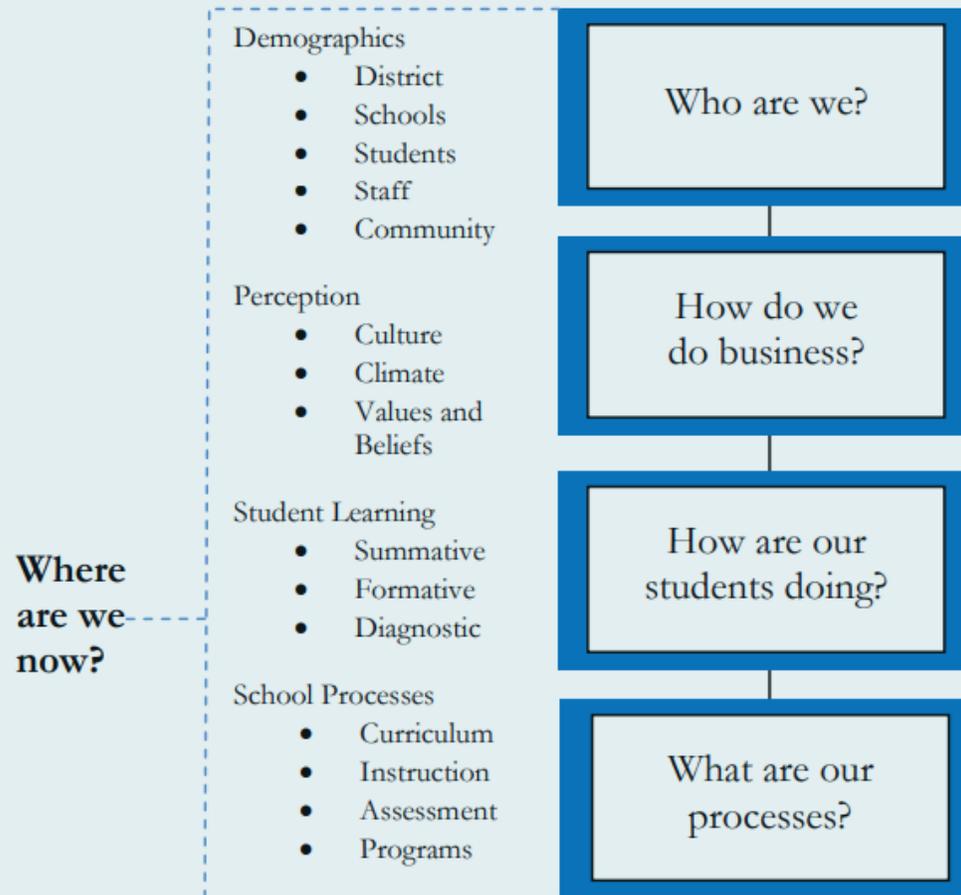

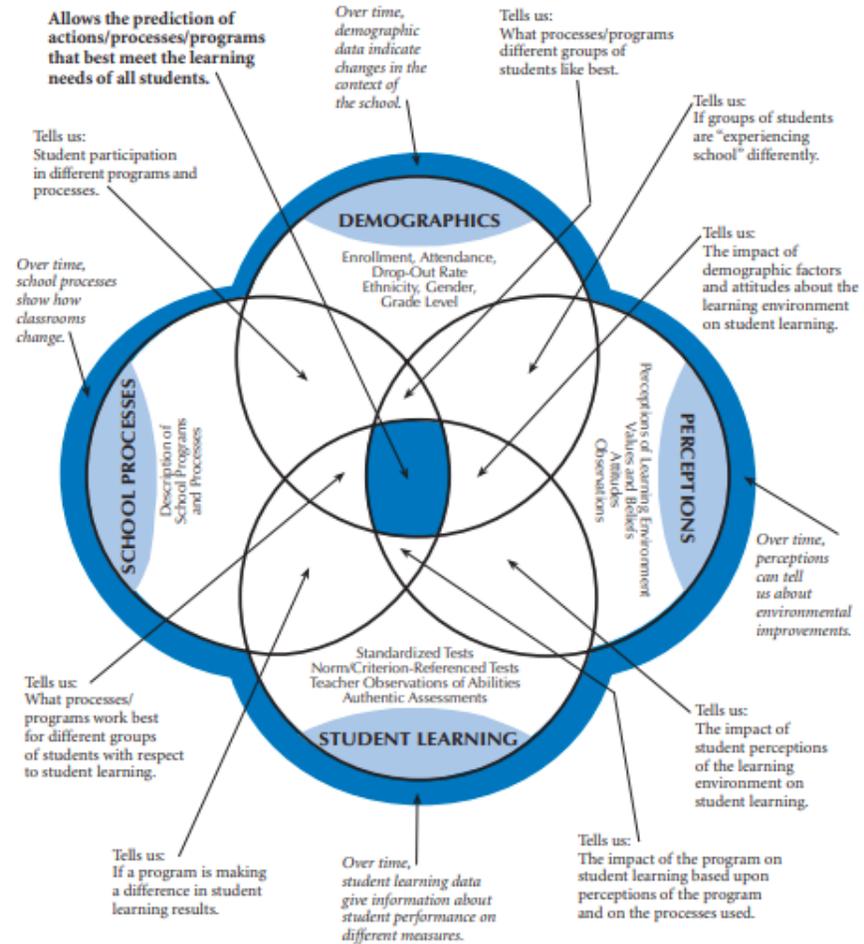


CONTINUOUS SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT FRAMEWORK Based on the work of Victoria Bernhardt

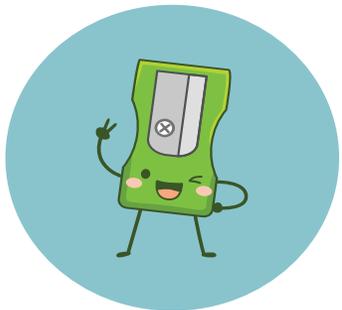

MULTIPLE MEASURES OF DATA



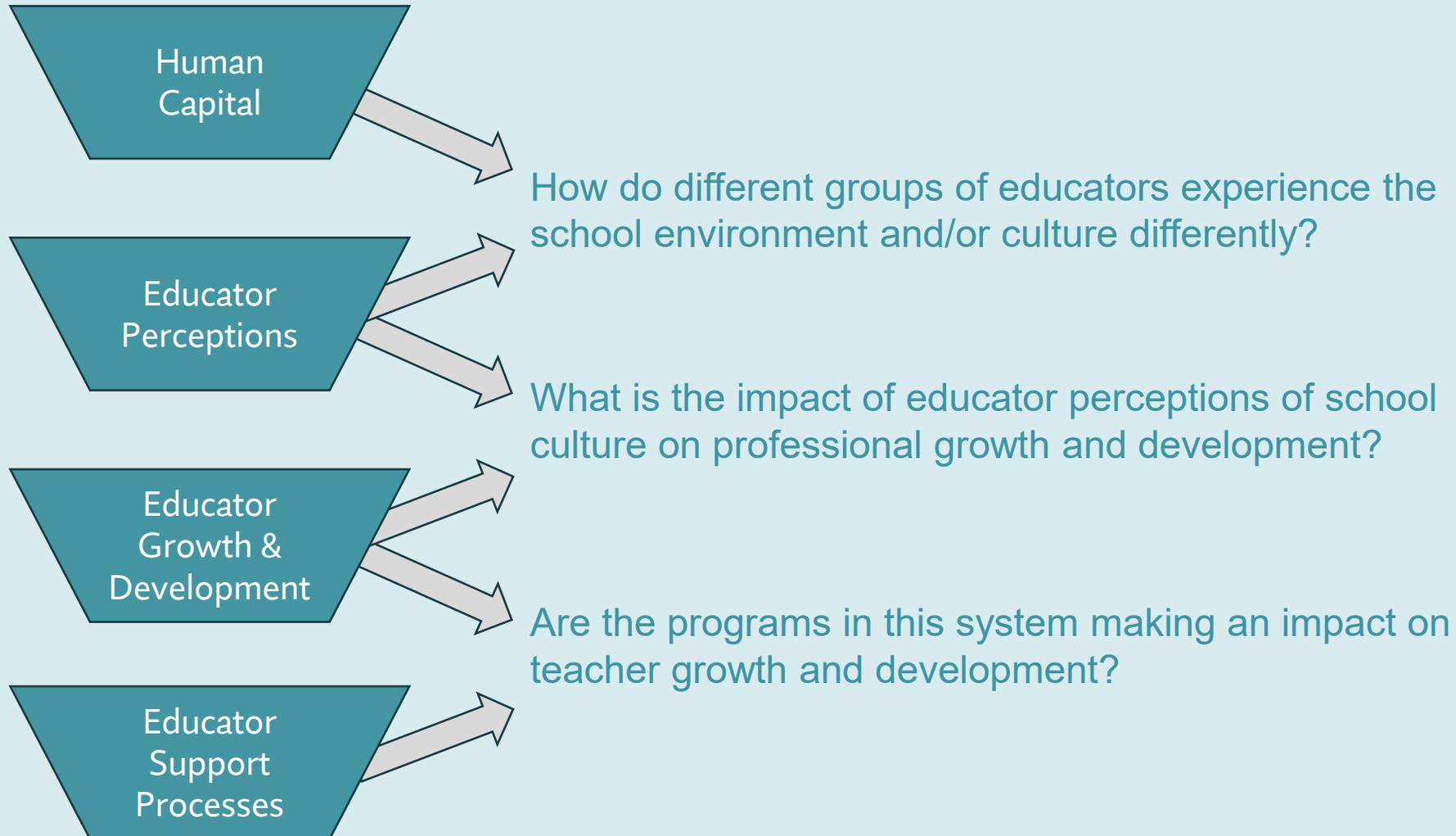

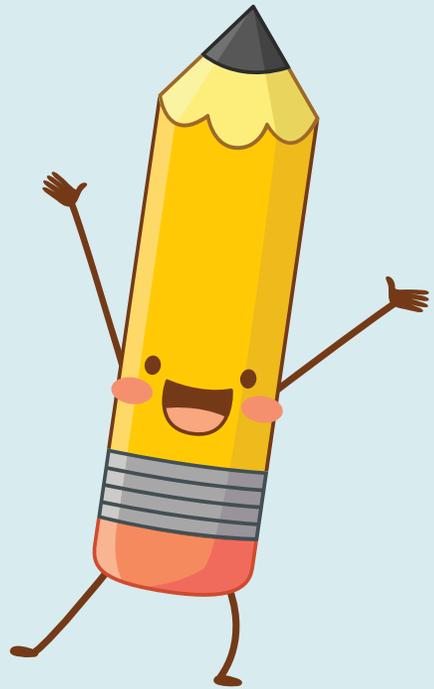

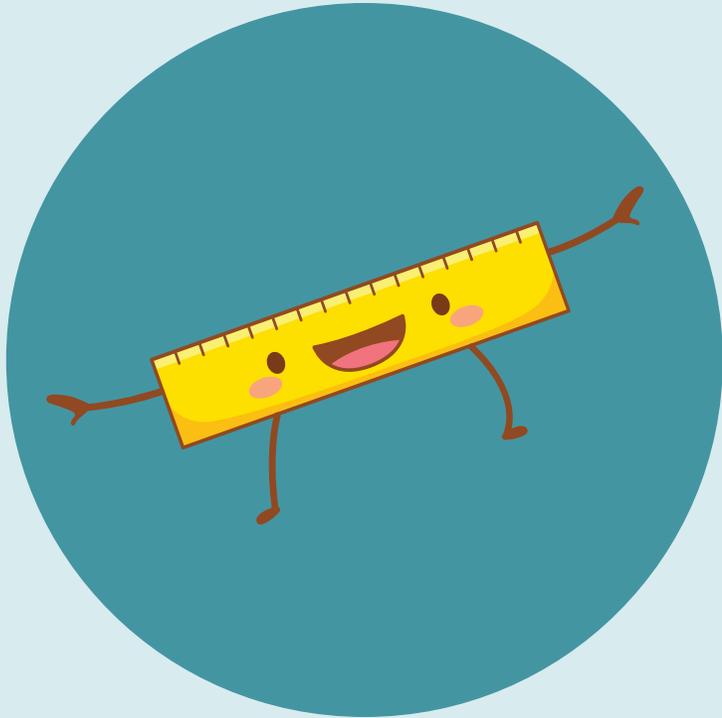




Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS)

For today's discussion, let's assume that the stakeholders in your school have determined that implementing a Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) is essential for achieving the school's improvement goals.

Evaluating the Process



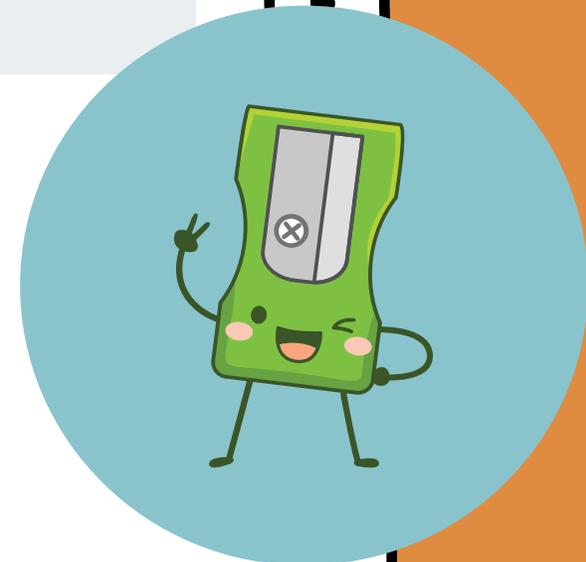
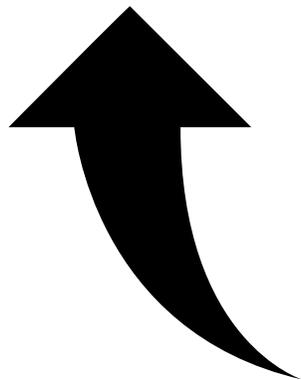
Success Criteria:

The completed plan will be reviewed and approved by the school leadership team, and at least **80% of K-6 staff** will report confidence in understanding their role in MTSS implementation through a survey administered at the end of the process.

Exemplar

- Research evidence-based practices, analyze current schoolwide data, and create a comprehensive implementation protocol for the Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) in Grades K-6

Development of Ownership and Cultural Shifts

1. Build Shared Understanding and Vision

- Engage staff, students, board of education, and families in co-creating a clear purpose for improvement.
- Connect initiatives (like MTSS) directly to student success stories so the vision feels real, not abstract.

2. Model Leadership and Commitment

- Leaders consistently demonstrate the behaviors and expectations they want to see.
- Recognize and celebrate small wins to reinforce the desired culture.

3. Foster Collaboration and Collective Responsibility

- Use professional learning communities (PLCs) or data teams where staff collaboratively analyze data and share practices.
- Shift the mindset from “my students” to “our students.”

4. Prioritize Capacity Building

- Provide ongoing professional development tied directly to the school’s improvement goals.
- Ensure training is job-**embedded** and followed by coaching, not one-off workshops.



Development of Ownership and Cultural Shifts, cont.



5. Establish Systems and Structures that Support Change

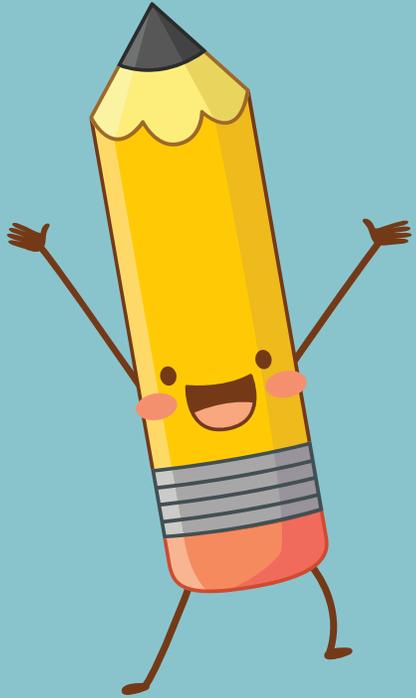
- Align schedules, resources, and policies to reinforce the desired practices.
- Develop Board of Education approved “[Protocols](#).”
- Example: If collaboration is a cultural goal, build in common planning time.

6. Encourage Open Communication and Trust

- Create safe spaces for staff to express concerns and provide feedback.
- Leaders listen actively, make adjustments, and communicate transparently.

7. Celebrate Progress and Normalize Growth

- Highlight stories of students and teachers who benefit from new practices.
- Treat mistakes as learning opportunities, which builds a growth mindset culture.



👉 In short: cultural shifts happen when values and beliefs are consistently reinforced by leadership, supported by systems, and experienced through collaborative practice.
